

glazed with rain water



a repetition of similar sounding words occurring at the end of lines in poems or songs

Visual or symbol

| Wall | Α |
|-------|---|
| Fall | Α |
| Men | B |
| Again | B |

Example

Humpty Dumpty sat on a **wall**, Humpty Dumpty had a great **fall**. All the King's horses, And all the King's **men** Couldn't put Humpty together **again**!
